

OUR CAMPAIGN

We're pushing back against attacks on voting rights by launching Every Vote Counts, a multi-year effort to amend Delaware's constitution, bring our state into the 21st century, and ensure Delaware becomes a beacon of democracy and strong voter engagement.

The campaign aims to:

- 1. Restore voting rights after felony incarceration,
- 2. Protect and expand early in-person and vote-by-mail, and
- 3. Implement same-day voter registration.



The right to vote, and to have one's vote accurately and fairly counted, is a fundamental right of all American citizens — and one that underpins the rest of our civil liberties.


A history of voting rights in Delaware

WHY DO WE NEED A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT?

Delaware remains a voting rights outlier due to restrictive and outdated constitutional language that has been relied upon by opponents of democracy to stymie progress.

This language has prevented simple legislation, which would allow for same-day-registration and universal vote-by-mail.

To protect and expand our democracy, we need to confront this challenge.



HOW WE RANK NATIONALLY

1 of 17

Voter Registration

Delaware is 1 of 17 states requiring voters to register more than 3 weeks before an election.

1 of 12

Voter Disenfranchisement

Delaware is 1 of 12 states that permanently disenfranchise at least some returning citizens.

1 of 14

Absentee Voting

Delaware is 1 of 14 states without access to no-excuse absentee voting.

NO-EXCUSE ABSENTEE VOTING

No-excuse absentee voting allows any eligible voter to request and cast an absentee ballot without needing to provide a reason or justification. This system expands access to voting by offering greater flexibility for voters who cannot or prefer not to vote in person on Election Day.

First leg of constitutional amendment to allow no-excuse absentee voting passes with bi-partisan support

Emergency powers invoked to temporarily expand absentee voting to all eligible voters

Second leg of constitutional amendment fails; remote voting seen as partisan

Law passed allowing for no-excuse vote-by-mail

NO-EXCUSE ABSENTEE VOTING

No-excuse absentee voting allows any eligible voter to request and cast an absentee ballot without needing to provide a reason or justification. This system expands access to voting by offering greater flexibility for voters who cannot or prefer not to vote in person on Election Day.

Legislation introduced to amend constitution and allow for no-excuse absentee voting

First leg of amendment to allow for no-excuse absentee voting fails on partisan lines

SAME-DAY VOTER REGISTRAION (SDR)

Same-day voter registration allows eligible citizens to both register to vote and cast their ballot on the same day, typically during early voting periods or on Election Day. This process helps increase voter participation by eliminating the need to register weeks in advance of an election.

Legislation creating SDR is introduced

Legislation passes with a simple majority

SDR law is struck down in the same lawsuit striking down no-excuse vote-bymail; the Supreme Court of Delaware asserts that SDR requires a constitutional amendment No effort has been made by the Delaware legislature to amend the constitution to reinstate SDR

THE IMPACT

Registration deadlines tend to be one of the nation's largest sources of disenfranchisement because many people like college students, renters, and low-income people do not always have the time, knowledge, or resources to finalize their registration weeks before the election.

A 2018 estimate found that if Delaware voters had access to same-day registration, there would have been 22,259 additional voters.

FELONY DISENFRANCHISEMENT

Felony disenfranchisement refers to the practice of restricting or revoking the voting rights of individuals convicted of felony offenses, either temporarily or permanently, depending on the laws of the state. This policy can vary widely, with some states restoring voting rights after completion of a sentence, while others impose lifetime bans for certain crimes.


Delaware's Constitution disenfranchises:

- 1. Citizens currently incarcerated for felony convictions
- 2. Citizens currently on felony probation, parole, work release, or another form of community supervision
- 3. Citizens who have committed particular felonies
 - a. Citizens in category 3 are permanently disenfranchised

THE IMPACT

In Delaware, thousands of people who are on probation or parole are disenfranchised every election, even though they are living in and contributing to our communities. Some Delawareans are permanently disenfranchised if convicted of certain crimes.

As of 2024, felony disenfranchisement affects 6,214 voters, 53% were Black, and 58% were no longer incarcerated.



JIM CROW ORIGINS

Criminal legal disenfranchisement laws have a direct connection to Civil-War era Jim Crow laws, which sought to deny Black Americans the right to vote.

EARLY IN-PERSON VOTING

Early in-person voting allows eligible voters to cast their ballots before Election Day at designated polling locations. This option provides greater convenience and flexibility, helping to reduce long lines and congestion on Election Day itself.

Legislation introduced to allow for at least 10 days of early voting

Legislation passes with overwhelming bi-partisan support

Lawsuit brought to challenge the early voting law

Early voting declared unconstitutional by a Delaware court

Supreme Court of Delaware reverses lower court decision, protecting early voting in 2024 but leaving it open to future challenges for no-excuse vote-by-mail

THE IMPACT

Early in-person and vote-by-mail allows for more young people, low-income communities, minorities, those without access to transportation or limited schedules, and those with high-risk health conditions to have their voices heard in the upcoming elections.




1 in 4 Delawareans relied on absentee ballots, vote-by-mail ballots, or early in-person voting in 2022 and 2023

DELAWAREANS WANT VOTING RIGHTS REFORM



IMPLEMENTING SAME-DAY REGISTRATION

59% of Delawareans support eliminating Delaware's registration deadline and implementing same-day registration.

ENDING FELONY DISENFRANCHISEMENT

72% of Delawareans support restoring voting rights upon release to people who are disenfranchised after committing a felony.

EXPANDING EARLY IN-PERSON VOTING

69% of Delawareans support extending Delaware's early voting period.

IMPLEMENTING VOTE-BY-MAIL

57% of support allowing all voters to vote by mail.


Secure 2/3 majorities in successive General Assemblies to amend Delaware's constitution.



TALKING POINTS

NON-PARTISAN

We work across party lines with politicians who have given us a reason to trust them to champion key voting rights reforms.

MULTI-YEAR PROCESS

Amending the constitution will take time (supermajorities in consecutive sessions). We are in this for the long haul!

AN OUTLIER

Delaware has become a tragic outlier in our nation. Without changes, it is the voters—of all political parties—who will suffer.

WHEN DEMOCRACY WINS, WE ALL WIN

The power of American democracy has always resided with the people first. Make no mistake, democracy will win in Delaware.

GRAB A PARTNER!

SCENARIO 1

A community member who believes their vote doesn't matter because they feel that elected officials don't represent their interests.

How would you explain the importance of voting in local elections and advocating to expand voting rights for all — despite whether a person chooses to vote or not?

SCENARIO 2

You encounter someone who is concerned about recent laws that could make voting more difficult for certain groups, like people with disabilities or those from marginalized communities.

How would you discuss the ways the EVC campaign is addressing these issues and encourage them to get involved ing the fight?

SCENARIO 3

A community member who mentions that they've heard about efforts to make early voting more accessible in Delaware but aren't sure why it's such a big deal. They mention that they've always just voted on Election Day and don't see why early voting is necessary.

How would you explain the significance of early voting, particularly for those who face barriers to voting on Election Day?


SCENARIO 4

A community member who believes that individuals with felony convictions should not be allowed to vote, arguing that they have broken the law and, therefore, forfeited their right to participate in the democratic process.

How would you approach this conversation to explain the importance of restoring voting rights as a step toward a more inclusive and fair democracy?
